This course provides a clinical and forensic science based model of care for forensic assessment and evaluation of patients/victims of trauma, violence and crime across the lifespan. Includes: child maltreatment, interpersonal violence, elder maltreatment, sexual assault, toxicology, and intentional/non-intentional trauma.

Upon completion you will be able to:

- > Apply forensic terminology to the clinical management of victims of trauma, violence and crime;
- > Develop a forensic assessment for children, adolescents, and adults who are victims of trauma, violence and crime;
- > Outline the categories of forensic evidence in its various forms such as physical, direct, trace;
- > Outline how to collect forensic evidence from victims of trauma, violence and crime;
- > Assess the differences between medical documentation and clinical forensic documentation procedures including accuracy, completeness, and chain of custody for forensic evidence collection;
- > Interpret the effects of alcohol and drug toxicology on the human body;
- > Outline the judicial role and qualifications of an expert witness versus a medical witness within the Canadian justice system.
